

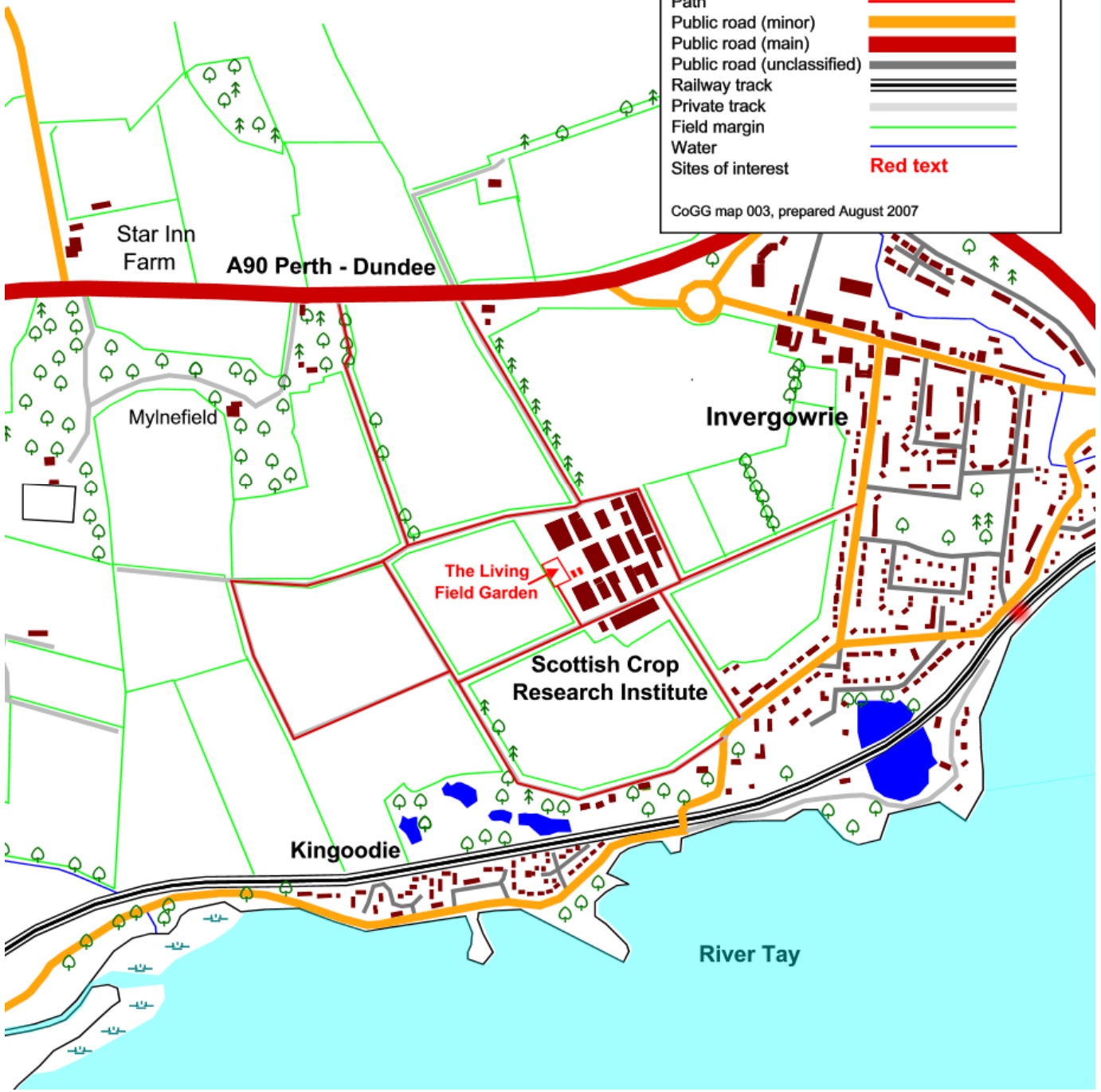


Invergowrie Walks Network

Invergowrie Walks Network

Location	The Invergowrie walks network lies to the west of Invergowrie and is located on land managed by the Scottish Crop Research Institute.
Type	Established walks network. Look out for sign posts with names of individual walks.
Description	In 1998 a walks network was established in Invergowrie based on the farmland managed by the Scottish Crop Research Institute (SCRI). The SCRI Living Field Garden can be easily accessed from the walks network. The paths are mostly wide, surfaced and largely level, but there are several rougher sections. However, most of the paths are suitable for wheelchair, disabled and pushchair access.
Distance	Various depending on route taken.
Parking	Parking is available in Invergowrie and Kingoodie, please take care not to block access.
